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(why do we so often remember that incorrectly, and does it even matter?)





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
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1) The "wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling together"

(why do we so often want to read into that verse, and does it even matter?)





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



 How does that jive with what Jesus had already told Nicodemus in John 3:36?









 How is this mingled assurance and warning simply echoing what He'd said in John 3:16-18?









But if "eternal life" is living in relationship with Christ, then—just as there will be a perfection/completion in the "new Heaven and new Earth" that is to come, there will be a perfection/completion in our redeemed and sinless relationship with Christ in eternity

How is this inheritance—this "living hope" that is still yet to come—still affecting us right now? How would you explain the importance of this absolute hope to someone?





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
