In the Old Testament, the word for "Spirit" ("חור" or "ruach") is grammatically feminine in form, and in the New Testament, the word for "Spirit" ("תרעבּטֹׁµֶם" or "pneuma") is grammatically neuter in form but Jesus repeatedly breaks with proper grammar to refer to the Spirit as a "He" (John 16:13-14, etc.)






